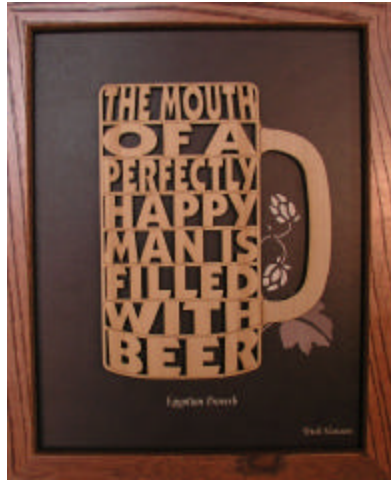

A heart whose love is innocent.*

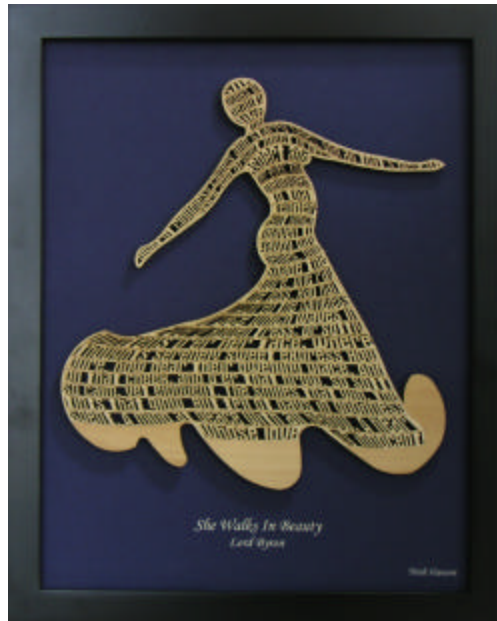

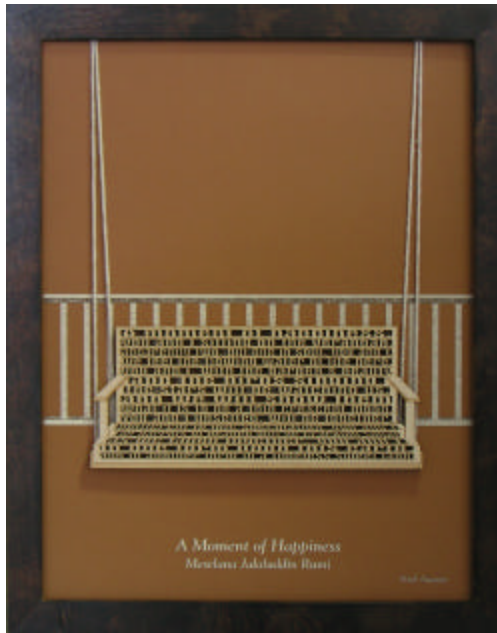
A Moment of Happiness
